Dear colleagues and friends,



NAGPRA Community of Practice

The archaeology department is an active participant in the <u>NAGPRA Community of Practice</u>, a group led by the University of Denver Museum of Anthropology. Their mission is to build a network of members from museums, tribes and other agencies to share knowledge and information regarding the implementation of The Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act. The group also seeks to create a network of support for NAGPRA practitioners across the U.S. Our team has had the opportunity to meet with the NAGPRA Community of Practice group in Denver and Alaska, and plan to facilitate a session at the Oklahoma Museum Association and the Mountain Plain Museum Association annual meetings next fall.
