Archaeology Department Obtains ARPA Grant

The archaeology department was awarded a grant for \$16,765 that was provided by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and awarded through the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and the Oklahoma Department of Libraries. This funding will provide critical support to hire staff for collections management, especially related to our NAGPRA and repatriation work. OU's new Institute for Societal and Community Transformation (ISCT), headed by Dr. Shane Connelly, has committed to providing matching funds for this grant.

Why Digital Archaeology? A Case Study from Monte Albán

Marc Levine, curator of archaeology and Alex Badillo (Indiana State University) published a paper in The SAA Archaeological Record highlighting the digital applications they are using for their work at Monte Alban—a prehispanic urban capital located in Oaxaca, Mexico. This work, focusing on the capital's Main Plaza, includes drone-aided aerial photogrammetry, 3D modeling, 3D printing, and the development of a virtual reality (VR) environment. They are currently developing a beta-version of their VR model in collaboration with Edify, an educational tech-startup associated with the University of Glasgow.

USACE Move




In October, the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), Tulsa District, moved all USACE owned collections, held-intrust in the archaeology
