Program Overview

The museum educator will lead the class in a discussion about how people use natural resources, like oil, in everyday life. The class will learn the difference between natural resources and manufactured products. Students will end the class with an activity where they classify a variety of objects to decide if they are found in nature or produced by humans.

Objectives

After participating in this program, students will be able to:

- Understand the difference between natural objects and objects made by people;
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 - Define natural resources and manufactured products;
 - Match a manufactured product with the natural resource from which it is composed.

Background

Many natural resources are collected from the Earth and produced into manufactured products that people use in everyday life. For example, once oil is drilled and collected it is then processed into different materials like plastic, nail polish, and ink.
