Historic Year for NAGPRA

The totals are in, and we are happy to report that 2024 was a record-setting year for NAGPRA (Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act) compliance at the Sam Noble Museum. In the past year, we published two Notices of Inventory Completion (see below) in the Federal Register that included at total of 751 ancestors (MNI or minimum number of individuals) and 857 associated funerary objects. This is the largest MNI total for any year in the history of the museum. This is a truly impressive amount of work, and kudos are in order for all of our staff. We are also grateful for the funding that has been provided by OU's Office of the Provost to complete this important work.
